Mool Makguksu It is a traditional Korean noodle dish made with buckwheat noodles served in a cold dongchimi kimchi soup.</p>	<p>3. Bibim Makguksu Bibim Makguksu is a popular variation of makguksu in Korean cuisine. While traditional makguksu is served with a cold dongchimi kimchi soup, bibim makguksu is a spicy and tangy version of the dish. "Bibim" in Korean means "mixed," and in this context, it refers to the way the ingredients are combined.</p>
